Thank you for allowing me to walk with you during some of the most significant times of your lives ... 40 funerals (30 for members), 26 baptisms, 15 Confirmations, 14 weddings (9 for members) and countless hospital and nursing home visits.

Thank you for sharing your faith journeys in words and deeds. Together we have grown in in our faith and in our relationship with God. Together we have

pursued God’s mission as we have understood it, resulting in so many beautiful “God Moments” shared and celebrated!

That’s the very BEST thing about being your pastor ... seeing God at work in and through you and getting to be a part of it. I know you will keep it up!

Christ Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes – July 9, 2019

Members Absent: Tom Jett, Sara Klusmeyer

At 6:33 p.m., Dick Tabb opened the meeting with prayer and led devotions, Sara Klusmeyer will provide devotions in August. Dick called the meeting to order at 6:36 p.m.

Additions to the Agenda: There were no additions

Approval of Minutes: After review and a correction in the Memorial Garden Committee report from “3 landscape stones and 2 benches” to “2 landscape stones and 3 benches.” Motion to approve the June 11 council meeting minutes approved.

President’s Report: Dick Tabb reported that the Parish Administrator, Bonnie Scranton, would begin on July 16, 2019. Her office hours will be Tues. through Fri. from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Also, Pastor Maureen Stein said that pulpit supply should be arranged for September 2019. Pastor Stein will meet in closed session with the Church Council on August 13, 2019. The regular council meeting has been moved to August 20, 2019.

Pastor’s Report: Pastor’s printed report for June was distributed and reviewed. Bonnie Scranton will continue the Prayer Warrior program and is seeking help.

Treasurer’s/Financial Secretary’s Report: Printed reports for June were distributed by Bonnie Scranton for council to review and discuss. Motion to accept reports and to place the financial report on file for audit carried. Bonnie reported that the church received an anonymous gift of \$5,000 designated to be applied to the mortgage principal.

Ministry Team and Committee Reports:

- **Communications:** Bill Wolters reported that at the July 6 meeting the team discussed the possibility of hiring a paid tech person – whether staff or outside vendor. Tasks could include keeping the web page up to date, recording and posting Sunday service, and maintenance of office computer equipment. This would require council approval and inclusion in 2020 budgeting.
- **Fellowship:** Brandon Ross said the Fellowship Team had not met since the June Council Meeting. Bill Wolters raised the question of possible changes in the Coffee Hour beginning in August. He reported that this had been discussed at the Communications Team meeting, as it was seen as affecting member and visitor relations. Dick Tabb reported that discussion of proposed changes had been going on among the congregation members. After discussion regarding Coffee Hour, motion that the decision of what to bring for Coffee Hour should remain with the individual Coffee Hour groups carried.
- **Learning:** Dick Tabb shared a report from Sara Klusmeyer that the Blessing Buddy event on June 23 was a good time for all. There will be a meeting on July 17 to explore the formation of a Youth Group with the youth of CLC and LMC. The mulching of the playground has been completed.
- **Mutual Ministry:** No report. Next meeting is July 16 at 6 p.m.
- **Property:** Jim Hobbins reported on the following projects:
 - 1) He presented a bid from Powell Brothers Plumbing and Heating to update the lighting to LED in the Fellowship Hall and several other locations. After discussion of how to finance this project, the Powell Brothers bid will be tabled until August, pending a report from Jim Hobbins about what is delaying the

resurfacing of the parking lot. 2) Jim stated that the financial plan for improving the south side of the church did not include the expense of preparing a foundation for the retaining wall that is planned. Jim will research the cost of moving and compacting the soil to support the retaining wall and report in August.

- **Service:** Katie Rupp reported that the team met on June 23 to discuss changes to the Strategic Plan. The Service Team will meet on July 18 at 5:30 p.m.
- **Stewardship:** No Report
- **Worship:** Kathy Buckman reported on the June 12 meeting of the Worship Team. Cathy Flick is interested in organizing special music opportunities during the summer months. On June 27 there will be a Service of Prayer for Healing. Pastor Gayle will be gone on June 30 and Pastor Jim Trutwin will preside. There was a discussion of pulpit supply for August and of a change in the order of service which will put the Children’s Sermon after the announcements. Hymns for July 7 through July 28 were selected. The next meeting will be July 17 at 5:30 p.m.
- **Risk Management:** Andrew Maas reported that the Serve-Pro Emergency Report contains the location of all emergency shut offs and the information of the individuals to contact. This report will be kept in the secretary’s office.
- **Memorial Garden Committee:** Bonnie Scranton reported that the garden lot has been cleared, the engraving is finished, and the brick is ready to be laid. The property team will be doing fences around the utility boxes and along the west wall.
- **Finance and Investment Committee:** The committee will meet in September to discuss the 2020 budget.
- **Endowment Committee:** No report
- **Columbarium Oversight Committee:** No Report

Motion that Ministry Team and Committee Reports be accepted carried.

Old Business:

- a. Pastor Gayle distributed copies of a draft of the updated Strategic Plan, saying that further updates are still needed. She will continue to work on it and the completed plan will be presented at the August meeting for council approval. It will be sent out ahead of time for review.
- b. There has been no response from First Baptist Church about a joint picnic. This has been tabled.
- c. Andrew Maas said the scouts and parents will paint the playground in the fall when it is cooler.
- d. Bonnie Scranton recommended that a room capacity be posted for the Fellowship Hall. After discussion, motion that a capacity of 125 people with tables and chairs, and a capacity of 250 with chairs alone, be established, posted and printed in the rental agreement carried.

New Business:

- a. Motion that Elizabeth, Jonah and Noah Bailey be accepted for associate membership carried.
- b. Pastor Gayle will be baptizing the children of Brittany McInnes – Patience Sapp, Bryan Comire, and Thackery Hargrave on July 21. This will make the children members of CLC. Motion that Brittany be accepted in membership by affirmation of faith carried.

Adjournment: Motion to adjourn at 8:20 carried. Meeting closed with the Lord’s Prayer.

I recently sat down with a food pantry manager (a volunteer who works with volunteers) to learn more about the people they serve. They are not serving many homeless and more than one-half of those they do serve are elderly. They serve an average of 33

families per month. There are usually three or four new families per week. Only Quincy residents are served in their pantry. Each family may visit the pantry six times per year. Sometimes people will say they have no food to eat in their home.

Five volunteers work each week. They "shop" with the individuals as foods are divided into different rooms. Pop top cans are good because not everyone has can openers. I suggested we might donate can openers but that will not help the situation. (They get lost, misplaced, etc.) Some of the greatest needs are toiletries of all kinds, pet food, anything that cannot be purchased with the "Link" card. Children's books are wanted at Luther Memorial. I am not certain about our other pantries. Thank you for helping to feed our neighbors and doing the Lord's work.

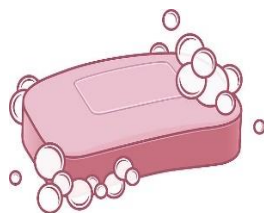

Missionary Corner Saying Goodbye to Cairo

Rupp: The following are Pastor Kirsten Fryer's thoughts and observations upon leaving Cairo, Egypt after serving six years at St. Andrew's. Next month we should have news of the newly appointed pastor for St. Andrew's, whom the Service Team has recommended we continue to support.

It was a Friday a few weeks after Easter. Nothing particularly special was happening. But as I watched during communion, I saw the beautiful community of people who I have grown to love so much. I watched as, one by one, people came forward with their hands held open. As Gloria, from the Philippines, took Ruth, a proud Scot, by the elbow to guide her to receive communion. I watched as Jonah, aged four, told Joanna that she had to wait in *this* line, and then as they each, with reverent joy, held out their hands when it came time to receive the bread of life. I watched as refugees from South Sudan came forward, one after the other, from several different tribes, and as Egyptians came to take communion from me, a Protestant, American woman. I was watching Pentecost play out as God's people, speaking so many languages, coming from so many places, somehow, understood one another and Christ's invitation to come. On that Friday, and so many others, I looked out and saw the body of Christ. It is so very, very beautiful. I will miss these people deeply and give thanks for this journey together.

On June 23, after almost six years, countless laughs, so much joy, many tears, heartaches, and frustrations, we said good bye to Cairo. Our decision to leave came after a lot of conversation, soul searching, and prayer. We know it's the right one for our family for now. We are waiting to see what the Holy Spirit has in store, spending some much-needed time with our families, and enjoying lots of green—and rain!



We made the most of the last few months in Cairo—with lots of dinners, last conversations with good friends, and one last restoration project at St. Andrew's! I am very proud that over my six years in

Cairo, we were able to restore the church from foundation to windows to roof, build a beautiful new classroom building, and complete this much needed Guild Hall work. The addition of astroturf in the garden was also a major development, giving refugees a safe, happy green space to gather. I am happy to leave the property in much better shape than I found it and hope that these changes will allow it to be used to serve the St. Andrew's community for many years to come!

As I reflect on these past six years, I am so grateful to all of the people who have supported us along this journey. Your prayers and support meant the world to us. We even kept your Christmas cards up all year to remind us of the community that loved, supported, and prayed for us. Thank you, thank you, thank you.

Estate Planning: Wills & Trusts

As they say, "Nothing is sure but death and taxes." I guess we could argue that for hours, but we are all

likely to at some time leave an estate that someone will have to deal with. Wouldn't it be much preferable to do this ourselves while we are still able, rather than let the government step in and do whatever they want with no regard to our wishes?

"Estate Planning" sounds like an exercise for the rich, but thanks to the complicated nature of the U.S. legal system, even we common folks need a written document that directs the disposition of our assets. Yet according to a recent Harris poll, 64% of Americans have not made a will. Some reasons? "Haven't gotten around to it yet." "It will be difficult and expensive." "People don't want to think about death."

All estates, with a will or not, are subject to review by state probate courts. Without written instructions to guide them, legal representatives often work slowly and follow set formulas that may not reflect your wishes. You can name the executor for your estate with a will. Executors can make decisions involving choices you do not want to leave up to the courts. For people with minor children, naming guardians is often the single most compelling reason to make a will.

If significant assets are involved, or circumstances are complex, you may want to consider a trust. A trust is a legal entity that owns the property and assets you place in it. You name a trustee (it can be yourself). If you do this, you should name a successor trustee. Trusts don't go through probate court and therefore don't become public. And they transfer property almost automatically upon death, getting assets to your heirs more quickly. You should consult an estate planning attorney both to figure out what kind of trust you need and to legally establish that trust.

A lot of information and forms are available online that allow people to make their own wills and trusts. However, and I have been through this process, it is my strong opinion that using a competent attorney is wise.
