Christ Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes – Apr. 14, 2020

Members Present: Dick Tabb, Matt Futhey, Katie Rupp, Bonnie Scranton. **Special note:** This meeting is being conducted by the executive committee, after approval from the council as a whole, due to the March 20, 2020 COVID-19 pandemic shelter-in-place order by Governor Pritzker.

Dick Tabb opened the meeting with prayer. Meeting called to order at 5:15 p.m. Additions to the Agenda: There were none.

Approval of Minutes: After review of the March 10, 2020 council minutes, motion the minutes be approved carried.

President's Report: In his report Dick Tabb mentioned that he had positive feedback about the Shepherding Circles efforts to reach out weekly to all members. He stressed the importance of continued efforts to "reach out." Dick presented a summary of the call committee discussion and efforts to advertise for a pastor on CLC Facebook page and in the "Living Lutheran" magazine. Dick asked for a recommendation from the executive committee. After discussion, the executive committee recommendation was, given the current "social distancing" restrictions, that the call committee continue researching and a final recommendation will be made when complete council is able to meet and discuss the issue. Dick agreed to pass this recommendation to Jerry Spurgeon, chair of the Call Committee.

Parish Administrator's Report: Bonnie Scranton presented a written report of activities for review and discussion. Responding to and carrying out the health recommendations concerning COVID-19; reaching out to members who do not have access to digital communications; and organizing virtual worship services were the key points of her report. Bonnie requested council input on including virtual communion in the worship service. She mentioned that the ELCA does not recommend virtual communion and presented information about Luther Memorial's use of virtual communion during the virtual Maundy Thursday service. The consensus of the executive committee was that if the Worship Committee decides to include virtual communion, than communion would be offered on the first Sunday of the month and members would supply their own "bread and wine". Motion that the Parish Administrator's report be approved carried.

Treasurer's/Financial Secretary's Report: Printed reports for March were distributed by Bonnie Scranton for council review and discussion. Bonnie also reported that the \$13,004.28 check from the Anita Wall estate arrived and was deposited in the Endowment Fund. She also reported on the approved transfer of funds from the MIF account to T&C savings account. Bonnie thanked the congregation for fulfilling their financial commitments. Motion to accept reports and place financial report on file pending audit carried. Bonnie Scranton made a request of \$800-1,000 for additional electrical services from Jansen Electric. Rather than having the property team, which currently cannot meet, change the light bulbs, she requested the church hire Jansen to do this and add a porch light while they are in the building working on previously approved projects. Motion that funds be made available carried.

Ministry Team and Committee Reports: (Reports of members not present were sent to Bonnie via e-mail.)

- **Communications:** Bill Wolters – No Report
- **Fellowship:** Diane Jones – No Report
- **Learning:** Matt Futhey reported that Trish Santos continues preparation and distribution of Sunday School packets for members with children.
- **Mutual Ministry:** Bonnie Scranton for Judy Bach reported that the Shepherd Leaders are receiving weekly assignments in the effort to keep connected. Each circle adopts a circle and members are assigned who to call. Bonnie Scranton makes the circle assignments each week.
- **Building:** Bonnie Scranton for Dave Tooke reported that Jansen has installed new lights in narthex, offices, and connecting spaces.
- **Grounds:** Katie Rupp reported that Bergman's is currently working on south and west landscaping projects; soil sample results show some deficiencies in potash and phosphorous; Roger Wegehenkel has agreed to be temporary committee chair; Dunn's have agreed to take down trees on north side of building.
- **Service:** Connie Hornsey – No Report
- **Stewardship:** Matt Futhey – No Report
- **Worship:** Bonnie Scranton for Jeff Clauss reported that the virtual worship seems to be going well with positive feedback. 244 hits were recorded on YouTube and Facebook for the Easter Sunday service. Worship team will meet Thurs., April 16. Items under consideration include virtual communion (See PA's Report for executive committee recommendation) and when to celebrate Easter once we reopen. After discussion the executive committee recommended that CLC follow the guidelines of the Adams County Health Department concerning worship as a community and establish a date once those guidelines are made public.
- **Risk Management:** Bonnie Scranton for Andrew Mass reported that Charlie Bach has agreed to do a safety audit of the playground equipment.

Motion that Ministry & Committee Reports be accepted carried.

Old Business: The Synod Assembly has been cancelled for this year. The Northwest Conference business meeting will be held via Zoom. Matt Futhey and Bonnie Scranton will attend as our voting members.

New Business: Health Department update on COVID-19. The Health Department representatives and county spiritual leaders held a virtual meeting. The Health Department stated that no parking lot services could be conducted with car windows down, no communion and no offering were to be made. Spiritual leaders stressed that they needed adequate notice when they could open for traditional worship.

Adjournment: Motion to adjourn at 6:23 p.m. carried. Meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Donations Needed More Than Ever!

It seems like today, the more things change the more they stay the same. We have been delivering food to the food boxes for one month. During that time, Jim and I have learned a lot. There is not a shortage of people who need food in our community. I had told you last month that our purpose was to feed children and their siblings who were not in school because of Covid-19. What we have learned over the past month is that those small boxes are feeding a much broader population. We have met some of the people who are accessing the boxes as we are filling them. People will come up and wait as we work and we have engaged them in conversation. One lady told us we were a Godsend to the homeless people. Observing what food she took, she was probably homeless or without cooking facilities. Others have said they have elderly

family members for whom they are caring or grandchildren in their care. We have people who would not usually be accessing the boxes who are also coming to them. People who normally are giving to others but they may not be working because their employer is shut down. They are the ones who hang back and wait until we leave before they go to the box.

Learning what we have over the past month, I am asking for you to change what you are purchasing somewhat, but not completely. Things that do not leave the boxes often or at all are canned corn and green beans and dry foods such as rice, beans and lentils. Foods that go quickly are individual puddings, individual fruits, individual packages of snack crackers with peanut butter fillings, individual bottles of orange juice and cans with pop top lids. The foil packages of individual servings of tuna, snack kits of tuna. Foods that can be eaten cold such as the microwavable individual soups or Spaghetti O's or other similar foods are good choices. Regular size cans of Beefaroni, Spaghetti O's, and similar foods if they have pop tops. Individual serving boxes of cereal work better than large boxes. Ramen noodles and macaroni and cheese in packages, boxes or individual sizes are in high demand. Vienna sausages and other finger foods are also popular.

Please do not limit your gifts to these items only. You are doing God's work, one can, one box, one package at a time! Thank you and God be with you!

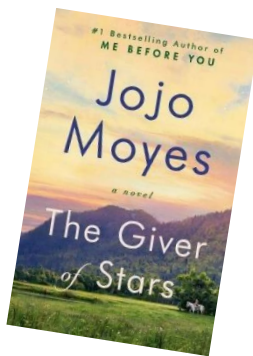

CLC Grounds Committee Update

If you have been by the church lately you will have noticed some

significant changes in the appearance of our property. New landscaping is in on the south side and on the west side next to the building. The three arborvitae trees on the north side up against the building have been removed, the entire outside of the building has been power washed, the rose bushes have been pruned and some of the islands out front have been weeded. And two new families have moved in. A robin is nesting on top of the light fixture by the front door and a dove is nesting in her usual spot outside the kitchen window. Given all we have been through since mid-March it will be wonderful to see God's creation of new life later this spring!

Two other improvements have been the installation of motion sensor lights for the Memorial Garden and the addition of a parking lot light on the end of the portico out front. The light on the far west end of the front parking lot (which we just learned we own) will be changed to LED and angled so that it lights more of the actual parking area.

Additional upgrades are being planned for this summer and fall. On the west side, all of the islands along with the three planted sections on the corners of the parking lot will be upgraded. And the work will begin next week to patch and resurface the asphalt parking lot on the east side. When that is completed both parking lots will have newly painted parking spaces.

We hope you will like the new look of your church grounds. It is because of your generosity that the grounds committee has been able to make these improvements and for that we are extremely grateful!

The Origin of Mother's Day

The present-day celebration of Mother's Day began in the year 1908 when Anna Jarvis organized a memorial for her mother, Ann Jarvis, a peace activist who used to care for the wounded soldiers of the American Civil War. The event was held at the St Andrew's Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia, which currently

holds the International Mother's Day Shrine. Anna Jarvis began the task of getting support for the celebration of Mother's Day in the United States in 1905 after her mother died the same year. She wanted to honor all the mothers of the world who have done a lot for their family and society.

Due to her continuous efforts, most of the US states by 1911 started celebrating Mother's Day as a local holiday and West Virginia, the home state of Jarvis, became the first state to declare the holiday for the occasion in the year 1910. Finally, the second Sunday of May was officially designated as Mother's Day in the USA and was declared as a national holiday after Woodrow Wilson, the 28th President of United States of America signed the proclamation in the year 1914.

Why do we celebrate Mother's Day?

Mother's Day is an occasion which is celebrated in various parts of the world to express respect, honor, and love towards mothers. The day is an event to honor the contribution of mothers, acknowledge the efforts of maternal bonds and the role of mothers in our society. Although, different countries celebrate the occasion on different dates, the common months of the celebrations are March or May.

It is a day which makes people remember the importance and significance of mothers in their lives and is observed as a day to give special emphasis to the motherly figures around the world.
